Dental Hygiene

It is essential to include dental care and hygiene (mouth, teeth and gums) in the care of your greyhound/s.

If teeth are not maintained, bacteria in the mouth cause a coating called plaque. If left plaque thickens and hardens becoming tartar or calculus. This causes inflammation of the gums often resulting in a condition called gingivitis. Gingivitis and dental disease if not treated, can lead to serious and even life-threatening diseases such as:

- Heart Infections
- Liver Infections
- Sepsis (Blood infection)
- Bone Infections
- Poor appetite
- Weight loss (due to pain of eating)

As this condition is common in the greyhound breed, it can be controlled with ongoing attention. GRSA recommend participants maintain their greyhound's teeth from an early age to maintain a healthy lifestyle.



We have included a **step by step guide** that will get greyhounds used to having their teeth cleaned over time. You will find this process easier when your greyhound is calm and comfortable and offered a special treat at the end of each cleaning session. If at any time a greyhound starts to struggle, **STOP** the process immediately. This process should be a positive experience.

Step 1: Start by gently lifting the sides of your greyhound's mouth, this will get them used to you touching their mouth, teeth and gums.

Step 2: Using a soft cloth wrapped around your finger, gently rub the teeth, working mostly on the outside [this is where the plaque and tartar will be built up the most]

NOTE* Go very gently on the gums


Step 3: Soak a soft toothbrush in warm water (using chicken or beef stock is a great idea to get them to enjoy the taste)
NOTE* stock is not to be used as a cleaning agent. Lift up the side of the mouth and gently start brushing the for 2 – 5 minutes or until your greyhound has had enough



Step 4: Once your greyhound/s are used to the brushing process you can introduce canine toothpaste.

NOTE: Never use human toothpaste! Canine toothpaste can be purchased at your local pet shop.

Step 5: We recommend that you check your greyhound's teeth and gums regularly for any signs of decay.



Additional teeth cleaning aids:

As well as brushing teeth, there are some other ways to maintain your greyhound's dental hygiene:

- Avoid feeling a wet food diet only. Feeding dry (unsoaked) kibble majority of the time or occasionally will help scrape off tartar and plaque off their teeth.
- Offer dental sticks, chew toys or treat them with raw bones. NOTE: Be sure to avoid cooked bones or small bones

Veterinary checks

Although cleaning and brushing process can be done in the comfort of your kennels, we highly recommend you have your greyhound's teeth checked and cleaned every 6 - 12 months by a qualified veterinary surgeon.

Keeping on top of your greyhound/s dental care and hygiene may seem like more time and effort. However, this could save you expensive veterinary bills. Additionally, this may will increase your chances of a quick adoption once your greyhound has finished their racing career, and most importantly keep your greyhound as healthy and happy as possible in all stages of their lives.
